Guest speaker Samantha Searls, Program Director of Ignite Peace.

Ignite Peace embraces nonviolent action as the pathway and strategy to systemic and societal change. Nonviolence is a way of life, a set of principles, a collection of practices for navigating conflict, and a toolbox for making change. Nonviolence is courageous and requires taking action in the face of injustice. Come hear what Ignite Peace is doing to promote nonviolence and anti-racism while addressing the issues of criminal justice and immigration justice in our region and beyond.

Sunday, October 26, **2025**, "Neurotheology: Is the Brain Hard-Wired for Spirituality?". Member Speaker **Tom Lottman**.

"Science without spirituality is incomplete; spirituality without science is blind." (adapted from Einstein). Neural networks such as the default mode network are consistently active when people describe spiritual experiences. This presentation will explore the intersection of Neuroscience, Theology, and Quantum Physics to suggest consciousness connections as a spiritual path. Jump with Tom down the rabbit hole of scientific thresholds, and come back with new, simple practices to inform your spiritual journey.

Konsious Konscience (Issue 2)

Hello again fellow members and friends of GNH.

Let's talk about the power of names. I was blessed to raise my godson, Ryan, from age 2 to 10, stepping fully into the role of father. When we reconnected just after his 19 birthday, I told him I now called myself "Khoa", the spiritual name given to me by my shaman teachers, indicating that he may still choose to call me "Poppa Joseph". He replied "oh no, Poppa, you told me that names are important...if you go by Khoa I will call you Poppa Khoa". In that moment I had the feeling that I had been the father I wanted to be--that I had an influence worthy of my aspirations in my son's life.

That feeling also demonstrated, in a concrete and personal way, what power resides in a name. People cite the admonition not to name a fear out loud lest you manifest it; complementarily, we also are told to speak our intentions because naming them helps us to walk a path on which they will manifest. That my son knew this and honored me by using it was a profound use of the power of naming. I have always fantasized about a culture that includes a self-naming ritual at some mid-life point when a member knows who they mean to become and chooses a name for themselves. Indeed, I chose to rename myself by first sharing that intention here in my spiritual home at GNH. Mahalo!

Another naming recently got some discussion after a couple of my messages in which I used "the Divine" where most use the word "God" or perhaps would simply not conceive of things in that way. I did some reflecting on this and I came to the following thoughts. I had used the phrase "the divine creative principle that is the source of everything" in those messages and grounded those words in ideas like "agape" and "gargantuan geode of god". The relevant definition of 'principle' would be a fundamental proposition or truth that serves as the foundation for everything that follows from it. Since the essential aspect of this source is that it creates—it is the creator of everything—we necessarily include that qualifier 'creative'. It would technically suffice to call it a --or the creative principle. Common usage by people writing about their journey of understanding it, typically, has that additional first word 'divine', which to me only scratches the surface of what an understanding of it feels like. I concur with that pattern of usage: just 'creative principle' carries insufficient significance.

The "divine creative principle of the universe that is the source of all" definitely is a mouthful to repeat throughout every conversation that pertains to the idea. We naturally settle into a short-form way of naming it. To adherents of traditions older than Western philosophy--rooted in other languages and cultures--there are many names that identify the divine creative principle.

They are bound in those languages to direct personal experiences of it. For a native of those traditions, thinking about what we may call the divine creative principle maps in their minds directly from the experience to the name. Great Spirit does this for many Native Americans. Taoism (a system of understanding that places "the way things are"--the patterns in the unfolding process of becoming--as the central source of reality) uses for that name "the Tao" (the way). Emerson used "the Oversoul".

The most commonly used term in the Western world, 'God', in its strong association with Christianity, poses a challenge for many. Much of the perception of that family of religions stems from the sociopolitical roles and constructs that have fallen to its leaders. The deeper ecstatic experience of their name for the divine creative principle remains hidden behind a veil. When that direct experience transcends the hierarchical obfuscation, mystics of those faiths--like the poet Rumi describes in the perceptions of God in his faith--know that same deep, innate mapping of the words *'God'* and 'Yaweh' to this source principle behind all. In seeking a short, simple term to capture the awesome and loving quality of this principle, finding a word can be challenging if you do not come from--or have left firmly behind in your spiritual evolution--those traditions that have such a mapping as a name provides. Or it may be that one identifies with the meaning as captured in multiple faiths and seeks a word to respect this plurality.

I personally went through an extended period where I leaned into my training as a scientist, seeing the spiritual through roughly humanist eyes. During that time I felt a need to eschew the associations with the word 'God' that had developed as a youth raised in a conservative and charismatic Christian tradition. Eventually the scars of those associations healed and my rejection of religious formalisms softened. I explored Buddhism and Taoism and Wicca, among others, ultimately being led to research on holotropic states of consciousness. Many similar descriptions of source had incubated in my mind, which I found in strong agreement with the way such research described *the divine creative principle that is the source of all*. One way to shorten that to a *name* simply is to say, *source* or *the Divine*. I like the contrast with my scientific disposition that 'divine' has over 'source'. So I call it *the Divine* for short; and I capitalize it because ... it's a big deal.

In the water communion service on October 12 we will bless our intentions moving into the next period of our lives with our community gathered waters, giving name to that of which we let go and calling to ourselves by name that which we intend. Your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to decide on those names. For next time, I'd like to hear your thoughts on the meaning of this column's title *Konscious Konscience*; and as always, any ideas you have for services.

Cook and/or Serve Lunch for homeless youth



Ways to give to GNH

GNH is grateful for all those who have kept up with their pledges during the pandemic and days of virtual services.

As you know, there are several ways to give of your financial resources to GNH:

- Mail a check to GNH.
- Ask your bank or credit union to mail a monthly check automatically. Many banks do not charge fees for this service. Check with your bank.
- Set up monthly or quarterly automatic payments from your investment accounts. Talk to your financial adviser.
- Use our online giving app, Givelify. Set up your personal confidential account at https://giv.li/phv85g. Download the Givelify app to your smartphone using the Apple Store or Google Play. Once you have the app, donating to GNH is as easy as Tap. Give. Done. (Note that Givelify charges GNH a transaction fee of 2.9% on each transaction, so you may want to increase your online donation by a small percentage to compensate.)

NEWSLETTER POLICY (September 2008)

All items that appear in the Harbinger should be of general interest to the members and friends of GNH and be consistent with GNH's mission, purposes, and policies.
